	3.2	Carry out pre-start checks on tractors.
	3.3	Make appropriate adjustments to settings, seat and mirrors on tractors.
	3.4	Carry out pre-operational maintenance checks and tasks prior to driving tractors.
	3.5	Prepare tractors to accept a range of selected attachments.
4. Understand the purpose of commonly used tractor attachments.	4.1	Explain the purpose of a range of tractor attachments including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Trailed and carried attachments • Soil engaging implements • Vegetation engaging implements • Push/pull implements
	4.2	Explain the risks to operators from farm implements including power take-off (PTO driven) implements.
	4.3	Select appropriate attachments for given tasks.
5. Be able to operate tractors and attachments.	5.1	Carry out appropriate risk assessments and pre-start checks prior to commencing tractor operations.
	5.2	Drive tractors safely and appropriately in line with relevant legislation and guidelines.
	5.3	Hitch selected attachments safely to trailers.
	5.4	Operate tractors with attachments safely to complete given tasks safely.
	5.5	Manoeuvre tractors and attachments safely and appropriately.
	5.6	Carry out Safe Stop procedure appropriately as required.
	5.7	Unhitch selected attachments safely.
	5.8	Leave unattached implements safely in storage fit for future use.
	5.9	Leave tractors safely in storage in a fit state for future use.

Training providers should deliver this unit in line with the following age restrictions:

Age	Allowed	Not allowed
Under 13	May ride on a trailer, or on a load carried by a trailer, if there are adequate means, such as edge protection, to prevent them falling from it.	Must not ride on or drive agricultural self-propelled machines (such as tractors and quad bikes) and certain other farm machinery.
13 – 16	May ride on a properly designed passenger seat. <ul style="list-style-type: none">Use a low-powered tractor with trailed rollers or harrows They may also be able to conduct the following operations: <ul style="list-style-type: none">Use a pedestrian-controlled slurry or manure scraperWork on the inspection platform of a potato harvesterRide an ATV, making sure their weight in relation to the ATV is appropriate, as weight transfer is key to safe and controlled handling	Must not drive or operate: <ul style="list-style-type: none">Towed or self-propelled harvesters and processing machinesTrailers or feed equipment with conveying, loading, unloading or spreading mechanismsPower-driven machines with cutting, splitting, or crushing mechanisms or power-operated soil-engaging partsChemical applicators such as mounted, trailed or knapsack sprayersHandling equipment such as lift trucks, skid steer loaders or track-laying vehicles.
16 – 18	May use larger machines and powered implements, but as an employer you must decide if this can be done, depending on the young person's experience and competence, not just their age.	

However, you should assess the individual's competency and experience, not just their age before allowing them to operate any machinery.
